David F. Hubbert, (1) of the Town of Chapin, in the County of Morgan, and State of Illinois, formerly a Soldier of the United States of America, in the war against (1) The C. S. A or Rebellion, respectfully asks that he be admitted as a member of said Home.

To enable the authorities to determine whether or not he is legally entitled to become a member of said Home, he declares and states the facts to be that he is now 56 years old, that he is 5 feet and 8 inches high; that he is of Light complexion, Grey eyes, and Brown hair; that he was born in the town of Janesville in the State of Ohio, on the 13th day of June, 1829; that he has been (2) once enrolled in the U. S. A. service; in the war against Mexico, and in the war of the late Rebellion; and that he has been (3) once honorably discharged from the service of the United States. That the following is a true statement of the time and place of his enrollment, and discharge from said service; and of the cause of his discharge, and of his rank at the respective date thereof, namely:

That he now receives, on pension certificate number 387544, a pension of six dollars a month, payable the 4th day of next July, at the Chicago Pension Office.

That he owns property, real and personal, of the value of nothing dollars, and no more; that he has no means of self-support other than that above named; that his trade or occupation is that of a Farmer

That he has (4) a wife; that he has 1 child now living; ages, respectively, (5) 53 & 32 years. That his postoffice address is Chapin, State of Illinois; that his nearest railway station is Chapin, on the Wabash Railway, in Morgan County in said State; that the name and address of the person, to whom he desires notice of his illness or death shall be given, is J. L. Simms, of Jacksonville, County of Morgan, State of Illinois; that, in case of his death, he desires all his personal effects to be sent to J. L. Simms, at Jacksonville, County of Morgan, State of Illinois

That he has not heretofore been a member of any Soldiers', Sailors', or other Charitable Home or Institution excepting the (6)

That he is now a bona fide resident of the State of Illinois, and has continuously lived and resided in said State for the last two years.

That he is so far disabled by (7) Rheumatism, Piles, defective Sight, and General Debility

as to now be incapable of earning his own living.

That he has at all times, heretofore, supported and adhered to the government of the United States of America, and that he has not at any time been engaged in, or countenanced, or aided, or abetted, the cause of the late Rebellion.

That if he shall be admitted to be a member of the said Home, he will, in all things and in every respect, comply with and conform to the rules and regulations made, or that shall hereafter be made, for the government and discipline of the same; and that he will cheerfully do and perform any and all things that shall be required of him by those there in authority over him; and that he will promptly, and willingly, obey all lawful orders that he shall receive from any officer of the Home, so long as he shall remain a member thereof.

- 5. Here give their ages, from youngest to oldest.
- 6. Here give the name of any Home or other Institution of which he has been a member.
- 7. Here state, *in his own words*, what it is that ails or disables him.
- 8. Here Applicant will sign his full name, or make his mark.
- 9. Here the witness will sign *his* name.
- 10. Here write "Notary Public," "Justice of the Peace," or "Clerk of Court."
- 11. Here Applicant will sign his *full name*, or make his mark.
- 12. Signature and title of the Justice or Notary.
- 13. To be made and signed by any Judge of any county or state court, by any Mayor, County or Circuit Clerk, Justice of the Peace, Police Magistrate, or Adjutant or Commander of any G. A. R. Post.

SPECIAL INFORMATION FOR APPLICANT.

READ THIS CAREFULLY. For it will *avail you nothing*, when you come before the Superintendent for examination on the facts alleged by you in your application, to say you are ignorant of what is here and herein plainly and explicitly set forth for your information:

- 1. Have some capable person, *who writes a fair hand*, fill all the blanks in your application.
- 2. Have every blank in the application properly filled, and every Certificate, except that of the Surgeon of the Home, duly made and signed, and every jurat duly executed, signed and sealed by the Clerk, Notary or Justice of the Peace making the same.
- 3. Send your application, so prepared, by mail or otherwise, *with your last discharge and all your pension papers*, to the Superintendent of the Home.
- 4. On his receipt of your application, and your last discharge, and all your pension papers, all in due form, transportation will be sent you, and you will be ordered to report at the Home for examination by the Home Surgeon as to your disability, and for examination by the Superintendent as to the allegations of fact made by you in your application for admission.
- 5. If all your statements are found to be true, and the Surgeon finds you to be so far disabled as to render you incapable of earning your own living, you will then be admitted to the Home, and not otherwise.
- 6. If, for any reason, you are found not to be eligible for admission, you will not be admitted to the Home.
- 7. If you fail to be admitted, no transportation to your home will be furnished you. Therefore, you should bring sufficient money to pay your return fare.
- 8. When permitted to leave the Home on Furlough, or on Pass of two or more days duration, you will be required to wear your citizen's clothing. You will not be allowed to wear Home or State clothing, when so absent.

TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR ADMISSION.

- 1. The law requires that you shall have served in the U. S. A. service, in the army or navy, in the war with Mexico, or in the late Rebellion.
- 2. That you shall have been honorably discharged from that service.
- 3. That you shall have lived and resided CONTINUOUSLY and in good faith, FOR THE LAST TWO YEARS, in the State of Illinois.
- 4. That you shall have been rendered INCAPABLE OF EARNING YOUR OWN LIVING, AND SHALL NOW BE INCAPABLE OF EARNING YOUR OWN LIVING, through the exigencies of your military service, by reason of old age, or by means of some other PRESENT DISABILITY.
- 5. That you shall now have NO PROPERTY OR OTHER SUFFICIENT MEANS OF LIVING.
- 6. That you shall be of sane mind; that you shall not be in need of an attendant; that you shall be capable of ministering to your own personal wants; that you shall have NO CONTAGIOUS OR INFECTIOUS DISEASE that would render your residence in the Home DANGEROUS to others; that you may SAFELY be quartered with men who are feeble and incapable of self-defence.
- 7. NO INSANE OR DEMENTED PERSON CAN BE RECEIVED OR CARED FOR AT THIS INSTITUTION. The State has elsewhere provided for the care and treatment of such persons.

United States Pension Agency.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:—

the following provision:—
An Act of Congress, approved March 2nd, 1895, contained

“That from and after the passage of this Act, all pensioners now on the rolls, who are pensioned at less than six dollars per month, for any degree of pensionable disability, shall have their pensions increased to six dollars per month.”

Under this provision, the rate of pension of Carig F. Kubert
Certificate 3875 H was increased to \$6.00 per month, commencing March 2nd, 1895, and he is entitled under instructions from the Commissioner of Pensions, dated March 6th, 1895, to hereafter execute vouchers for \$18.00 per quarter, upon exhibiting to the officiating magistrate, his pension certificate wherein the rate of pension appears less than \$6.00, PROVIDED THIS CIRCULAR IS ALSO EXHIBITED.

To the Pensioner:—

In order to carry out the intention of this law, under the Commissioner's instructions, a voucher for use April 4th, 1895, is enclosed, representing the amount due you upon that date under the increased rate, which voucher you should execute on or after April 4th, 1895, returning it for payment to this Agency, in the usual manner, ACCOMPANIED BY THE VOUCHER AT THE OLD RATE, which must not be executed, but merely returned for cancellation.

SECURELY ATTACH THIS CIRCULAR TO YOUR PENSION CERTIFICATE as it must hereafter be considered each time a voucher may be executed, in explanation of the difference in rate appearing therein, and in future vouchers.

The Commissioner of Pensions has stated that it is not the intention of the Bureau to issue an increase certificate in any of the cases affected by this legislation, and directs that this speedy means of facilitating payment be adopted for the benefit of the pensioner.

It is part of the consideration of this contract, and it is agreed, that the said Express Company ARE FORWARDERS ONLY, and are not to be held liable or responsible for any loss or damage to said property while being conveyed by the CARRIERS to whom the same may be by said Express Company entrusted, or arising from the dangers of Railroads, Ocean or River Navigation, Steam, Fire in Stores, Depots, or in Transit, Leakage, Breakage, or from any cause whatsoever, unless, in every case, the same be proved to have occurred from the fraud or gross negligence of said Express Company, or their servants; nor, in any event shall the holder thereof demand beyond the sum of FIFTY DOLLARS, at which the above property forwarded is hereby valued, unless otherwise herein expressed, or unless specially insured by them, and so specified in this receipt, which insurance shall constitute the limit of the liability of the Adams Express Company.

being of sound mind and memory, and considering the uncertainty of this frail and transitory life,
do, therefore, make, ordain, publish and declare, this to be my last **Will and Testament.**

First. I order and direct that my Executor hereinafter named pay all my just debts
and funeral expenses as soon after my decease as conveniently may be.

Second. After the payment of such funeral expenses and debts, I give, devise and bequeath
all my worldly effects of whatever nature, that
I may die seized to the Illinois Soldiers and
Sailors Home.

Lastly, I make, constitute and appoint Capt Wm Somerville or
his successors in Office to be Executor of this, my last
Will and Testament, hereby revoking all former Wills by me made.
