Be it Remembered, THAT on the 30th day of October in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty-Six personally appeared before the Honorable Mark G. Mullett Presiding Judge of the County Court of the County of Morgan and State aforesaid, (the same being a Court of Record, having and exercising common law jurisdiction, a Seal and a Clerk), and sitting judicially for the dispatch of business at the Court House in Jacks onville in the County aforesaid, Lewis Muttis

an alien born, free, white, male person, above the age of twenty-one years, and applied to the said Court to be admitted to become a naturalized citizen of the United States of America, pursuant to the several Acts of Congress heretofore passed on that subject, entitled "An Act to establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and to repeal the Acts heretofore passed on that subject," approved the 14th day of April, A. D. 1802; An Act entitled "An Act in addition to an act entitled 'An Act to establish a uniform rule of naturalization,' and to repeal the acts heretofore passed on that subject," approved on the 26th day of March, A. D. 1804; An Act entitled "An Act supplementary to the acts heretofore passed on the subject of a uniform rule of naturalization," passed the 30th day of July, A. D. 1813; the Act relative to evidence in cases of naturalization, passed the 22d day of March, A. D. 1816; "An Act in further addition to 'An Act to establish a uniform rule of naturalization,' and to repeal the acts heretofore passed on that subject," passed May 26th, A. And the said Lewis Muttis having thereupon produced to the Court competent and satisfactory testimony showing that he had heretofore enlisted in the Army of the United States and that he has been honorably discharged therefrom and he having first filed his petition and declaration of his intention to become a citizen of the United States, according to the provisions of the said several Acts of Congress, and the Court being satisfied, as well from the oath of the said Lewis Muttis as from the testimony of

And the said Louis Wetter having thereupon produced to the Court competent and satisfactory testimony showing that he had heretofore enlisted in the _____ Army of the United States and that he has been honorably discharged therefrom and he having first filed his petition and declaration of his intention to become a citizen of the United States, according to the provisions of the said several Acts of Congress, and the Court being satisfied, as well from the oath of the said Louis Wetter as from the testimony of Basel Warriman and Philip Crown who are known to be citizens of the United States, that the said applicant has resided within the limits and under the jurisdiction of the United States for at least one year, and one year last past within the State of Illinois; that during the whole of that time he has sustained a good moral character, and appeared to be attached to the principles contained in the *Constitution of the United States*, and well disposed to good order, well being and happiness of the same.

It is thereupon Considered, Ordered, and Adjudged by the Court, That the said Louis Wetter be admitted to all and singular, the rights, privileges and immunities of a naturalized citizen of the United States, and that the same be certified by the Clerk of this Court, under the Seal of said Court accordingly.
