David A. Williams (1) of the Town of JACKSONVILLE, in the County of MORGAN, and State of ILLINOIS, formerly a Soldier of the United States of America, in the war against (1) Rebellion, respectfully asks that he be admitted as a member of said Home.

To enable the authorities to determine whether or not he is legally entitled to become a member of said Home, he declares and states the facts to be that he is now 63 years old; that he is 5 feet and inches high; that he is of fair complexion, blue eyes, and grey hair; that he was born in the town of Lislephas Co in the State of Kentucky, on the 8th day of Oct, 1747; that he has been (2) once enrolled in the U. S. A. service; once in the war against Rebellion, and was in the war of the late Rebellion; and that he has been (3) once honorably discharged from the service of the United States. That the following is a true statement of the time and place of his enrollment, and discharge from said service, and of the cause of his discharge, and of his rank at the respective date thereof namely:

That he now receives, on pension certificate number 5451661, a pension of 12 dollars a month, payable the 14th day of next Jan 4 1912 at the Chicago Pension Office.

That he owns property, real and personal, of the value of none dollars, and no more; that he has no means of self-support other than the above named; that his trade or occupation is that of a farm hand.

That he has (4) 2nd wife; that he has no children now living; ages, respectively, (5) years. That his postoffice address is Postal 7, Jacksonville, State of Illinois, that his nearest railway station is JACKSONVILLE, on the Wabash Railway, in MORGAN County in said State; that the name and address of the person, to whom he desires notice of his illness or death shall be given, is Geo. S. Williams, of Wynnsburg, County of Lincoln, State of Kentucky; that, in case of his death, he desires all his personal effects to be sent to same at Lincoln, County of Ky, State of Ky.

That he has not heretofore been a member of any Soldiers', Sailors', or other Charitable Home or Institution, excepting the (6)

That he is now a bona fide resident of the State of Illinois, and has continuously lived and resided in said State for the last two years, or has served in an Illinois organization.

That he is so far disabled by (7) rheumatism + paralysis

as to now be incapable of earning his own living. That he has at all times, heretofore, supported and adhered to the government of the United States of America, and that he has not at any time been engaged in, or countenanced, or aided, or abetted, the cause of the late Rebellion.

That if he shall be admitted to be a member of the said Home, he will, in all things and in every respect, comply with and conform to the rules and regulations made, or that shall hereafter be made, for the government and discipline of the same; and that he will cheerfully do and perform any and all things that shall be required of him by those there in authority over him; and that he will promptly, and willingly, obey all lawful orders that he shall receive from any officer of the Home, so long as he shall remain a member thereof.


On February 5, in response to my letter of February 3, 1931, relative to David Williams, deceased Civil War veteran, you advised that you failed to find this veteran listed as even being a member of the Home. You made reference to David Williamson, who died at the Home November 23, 1904. Apparently the record you found was not of the David Williams I inquired about, and for your information and to assist you in identifying this case I quote below a letter received by Mr. George T. Williams, Waynesburg, Kentucky, dated August 11, 1918, signed by John E. Andrew, Superintendent:

"In regard to your letter of the 10th, will say that Mr. David Williams is much better. For a short time his condition was somewhat serious, but at the present much improved.

Mr. Williams has placed to his credit here sufficient means for his burial, however in case of death will notify you and ship body as requested."

I would appreciate your making further inquiry into the matter and informing me whether you have a record of this particular veteran and furnishing me with any information you are able to find regarding the disposition made of his property after his death. This information is desired by a Cincinnati relative of the deceased veteran.


I am shipping the body of your Brother David A. Williams, leaving Quincy today via St. Louis at 2.40 P.M.
